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

Heartland Motorsports Park in Topeka and the Kaw Valley race Group hosted event #3 of the Mid-States Majors Tour and the MiDiv Time Trials Series. We had 71 race entries and 24 Time Trials entries for a total of 95 participants. Saturday's weather was WET, with torrential downpours around lunch time delaying the racing until the lightning let up. It continued to rain all afternoon and most race groups racing in strong downpours with puddles and streams on the racetrack throughout the races. Luckily, there were minimal mistakes and incidents and nearly all drivers finished unscathed. Overnight rain left the track mostly dry for most qualifying sessions, where drivers put their dry tires on to set the fast laps of the weekend thus far for qualifying day 2. My First Race

I guess I have always been what you would call "A Car Guy". In High School (I graduated in 1974 from Shawnee Mission South) I had my first experiences with "muscle cars". Everyone was driving them, they were cheap, so was gas, and it seemed the girls thought they were cool. I bought my first muscle car from Andy Klein Pontiac, a 1968 GTO with 48,000 miles for \$1,800 in 1974. That car ignited a passion for performance cars that is as strong as ever today.

I have never looked at cars as "just" a means of transportation. I learned early on that people with muscle cars liked to compete for bragging rights on who had the fastest car. Heck, in the mid 70's you could cruise by the carwash in downtown Overland Park and find a dozen guys and one girl, Heidi (who has a 427 69 Camaro and she knew how to drive it), who wanted to race. Kansas City International Raceway and the Lawrence 1/8 mile drag strip were popular destinations.

After the GTO, I had many other muscle cars, a 69 428 Super Cobra Jet 4-speed Mach 1, a 70 Boss 302, a 69 GTO Ram Air IV, a 70 Shelby GT500, and a 66 GT350 to name just a few. After graduating from KU with my degree in Business Administration I even got into the car business because of my passion for cars. It was a fun and very successful career, one I enjoyed for 36 years. I got married in 1981. I actually had a wife that loved me so much she agreed to go on vacations to the Mid-America Shelby Meet in Tulsa from 1983-1986. That event included 2 days of open track events at Hallett Motor Racing Circuit in addition to drag racing and a car show.

When I saw the vintage race event featuring Shelby Mustangs, Boss 302's, GT40's and Cobras (yes, real ones back then) I realized I could expand my performance experience longer than 11-13 seconds on the drag strip. These guys and gals were out there racing for 30 minutes and boy was it exciting. It looked like a blast to me, but when I mentioned it to Mary she said "not so much". All that responsibility stuff and expense stuff and you know, logic. Anyway, the seed was planted and I knew when the timing was right it would be something I wanted to try.

In 1996 I was working for a Dealer in Omaha who put on a 2-month challenge letting me name my bonus if we hit the agreed performance level. I told him I wanted to go to the Bob Bondurant 4-day Grand Prix Road Racing Driving School and we agreed on that prize. Of course, I hit the bonus and went on the trip to the school. I figured with all of my years driving performance cars I would have a hand up on the other students, boy was I wrong. After my first ride with the instructor in the school bus on the racetrack I realized I didn't know the first thing about real car control and finesse. Over those 4 days I learned a lot, knowing that this was just the tip of the iceberg.

After the course I made some modifications on my 75 Jensen Healey and started going to HPDE events at Heartland Park with any club I could go with, Audi Club, Porsche Club, BMW Club, and the SCCA. I sold the Jensen Healy and picked up a 1995

Mustang Cobra R, which was better suited for track day events, it even had a cage, a race seat and fire system. I continued to run the car in HPDE events and tried to read everything I could about driving.

Over the years of attending the events I had some great instructors, including Kent Prather and Britt Brown. At a SCCA PDX event in 2001 Britt Brown was my instructor. After riding with me Britt said "You know Mike, we aren't supposed to be timing these events, but we do anyway, and you are the fastest car on the track. Have you ever thought about racing competitively as opposed to PDX?" I informed him I didn't want to get my car all banged up since I kept it in showroom condition and it was a bit of a collectible car, one of only 250 made.

He said car to car contact was frowned upon in the SCCA and only in rare circumstances does it happen. I told him I'd consider it and he told me about the next race weekend in July. I hooked up with Bob Henson the following weekend who helped me determine my car would fit into the ITE class, and he issued my car a log book after inspecting it. Using my Bondurant School and my PDX events, I was cleared for my Competition license. I registered for the race, bought a GCR (they were printed back then, not online) and actually read the GCR cover to cover. I was ready for my first race!

My 1st race was at Heartland Park in Topeka, it was the Return of the Beach Bunny VII Regional/Driver's School on July 21st, 2001. We ran the 2.2 mile configuration and I was in group 1, one of 34 competitors in the group. When I lined up on the grid for qualifying, I started to get a little scared. I was lined up right next to Chris Albin's VW Golf. I could see yellow duct tape holding stuff in place, a couple scratches and quite a few places that looked like DENTS to me. I thought Britt told me no bumping? What about the part in the GCR about no visible body damage? Oh well, I figured I should out accelerate him so I shouldn't have to worry about it. I did well in qualifying and qualified 2nd in my class and 3rd overall (I did have more horsepower than most other competitors).

During the race I kept my focus on running smooth laps, and took care when passing other cars. It seemed like I was faster on the straights than many cars, but a lot of the little cars would catch me in the corners (like Chris Albin and Paul Brown). It wasn't until after the race that Paul Brown, Britt's brother, explained to me about momentum cars and not getting in the middle of a heated battle between cars in other classes. At about the middle of the race in traffic when I was going through the bus-stop 8-9 area Chris Albin would come speeding up on my tail. After 1-2 laps like this he started tapping my rear bumper lightly in the exit of 9, before my horsepower took over. After the race in impound I checked my bumper and it was fine, not so much as a scratch.

I had finished 4th overall and 2nd in class, so I felt good, but still wanted to win. I decided since I was new to all of this I'd ask about the bumping in the turn, so I found Bill Johnson's Sr.'s name in the supplemental regulations as the Stewart of the Meet. I told him about the yellow VW Golf bumping me in the turn. He replied, "Oh, that's Chris Albin, you were probably going too slow. Speed up! Anything else?" I said I guess not, thanks Mr. Johnson.

Looking through the results sheet from that race I see many names of people we raced with for years, some are still around and some of them have passed away. Over the years I've met some of my best friends at the race tracks, they too share the same passion for performance and continuous improvement and the thrill of competition. You know, Car Guys and Girls.

Jim Wheeler Earns the John McGill Award

Long-time member of the Kansas City Region, Jim Wheeler, was honored at this year's SCCA National Convention during the Hall of Fame Induction and Awards Ceremony as the 2019 recipient of the John McGill Award. The SCCA National Club Racing Board (CRB) and the Vice President of Road Racing select the winner of the John McGill Award in recognition of the recipient's significant contributions to the Road Racing Program. Jim went to his first SCCA event in 1958 and first competed in an SCCA autocross event in 1969. He began his road racing career with a driving school in Wentzville. MO in 1975 and has

since competed in nearly 300 races. Jim has also been involved in various leadership roles both at the regional level with the Kaw Valley Race Group as well as serving on the CRB including being its Chairman for several years.
